He has devoted almost entirely his active professional life to local and regional political life. As a member of the National Assembly of Quebec, he was responsible, for nearly 20 years, for the political office



VISITOR PROFILE

The profiles of visitors are varied and essentially the same as in previous years. The profiles encountered according to their frequency are:

- * On this subject, we receive a lot of positive comments since the places where dogs are accepted for hiking are becoming increasingly rare.

It is impossible for us to count the number of visitors who go directly to the trails, without going through the reception centre. However, between April 27 and October 30, 2022, 2,210 visitors passed through the site's reception desk. In addition, towards the end of September, a hiker counter was installed by ECCC for the Digue aux Aigrettes trail, and we were able to count 410 visitors on this trail for the months of September and October 2022, and for the same period we were able to count 655 visitors who passed through the reception desk.

July was the busiest month with no less than 511 visitors at the reception desk alone. We noticed a small increase in traffic at the reception station compared to the previous year for the months of August and October.

On the other hand, we estimate the number of people who would have visited our trails, including those who would not have gone through the reception, about the same number as in previous seasons, i.e. more or less 5000 visitors in total for the 2022 season. This which shows us a decrease of almost 16% of our usual traffic.



Our 1500th visitor this season was received on August 26, wegavehima "VIPFamily" membership card and a "Free-pass" card at the Droulers/Tsiionhiakwatha Archaeological Site Interpretation Center.








BY REGION- 2022



COMPARISON 2021 & 2022 FREQUENCY OF VISITORS PER MONTH











DUR MEMBERS

MAINTENANCE CONTRACT (ECCC)

For almost three decades, the Friends of the Lac Saint-François National Wildlife Area have been responsible for the reception, maintenance, animation, surveillance and security of the site. This year again, we honored our contract by carrying out our mandate with rigor and professionalism. The objectives of the organization have been achieved, and even exceeded.

The Friends of the Lac Saint-François National Wildlife Area greatly appreciated ECCC's support and involvement in the field throughout the season, especially in the context of adaptation for the two organizations regarding the new toilets and the new reception and the issues that have been apparent during the construction the site of the new observation tower in the path of the Digue aux Aigrettes.

Among the specific tasks to be accomplished, the control of invasive species is a major challenge for our organization, it must be carried out at busy times of our season, that is to say at the opening and during the month of July, when visitors are more and more numerous. Under ECCC oversight, we are responsible for controlling these invasive species, garlic mustard and frogbit.

Garlic mustard control

The 2022 season started later than usual. The employees returned on May 10th. Given the late start of the school year as well as the preparation related to the resumption of all activities, the employees were overloaded and did not have time to check the garlic mustard at the start of the season. Lack of maintenance staff, other employees had to fill maintenance tasks.

That being said, the team completed the uprooting of garlic mustard on the Digue

aux Aigrettes on May 26th. It was a team of 4 to 6 people. The abnormal heat made it difficult for the employees. They were dressed in overalls to protect them from ticks from the work that took place on the Digue aux Aigrettes trail, we noticed a drop in garlic mustard in some of the areas that had been identified in previous years.



For another year, we appreciated the help of the CIME Haut-Richelieu for the Érablière trail in Caryer-Piasetski. Around

June 22nd, they uprooted 186 kilos of garlic mustard for 7 hours of work for 5 people. There was one last section left to do following their day, so the Friends team headed out to finish the job for a final 50 kilos.

Frogbit control

The date for the start of the control had been delayed, from which it began on June 26th by the guides-interpreters.

However, the intense workload due to the resumption of activities, the lack of maintenance employees which had to be compensated by the team as well as the oppressive heat of July meant that the work was carried out more slowly.

In the end, about 45 hours of work were done by 6 employees, a total of 75 wheelbarrows were filled. Unfortunately, they didn't have time to fully complete the frogbit control before the majority of the team had to go back to school.

This task requires a lot of time for the AMAPRE team. All the same, the maintenance employees, the guide-interpreters, the liaison agent, the activity coordinator, the marketing agent worked tirelessly throughout the season (almost until mid-October) to remove as much of the hydrocharide as possible.

TRAININGS

With the return of the entire 2020 team, there were still some team members who needed training in first aid, nautical and on the flora and fauna of the reserve.

Here are those who have followed the following trainings:

- Each member of the AMAPRE team has received training related to their position.
- The two new interpreter guides (Mariève Hébert and Marc-Olivier Roy), received first aid training in the workplace on June 14th and 15th 2022, they also received their training in sea kayaking and for calm water canoeing and Rabaska on May 27th, June 3rd and June 20th.
- On June 8th, we were 8 employees who had their training and received their restricted operator certificates (maritime) VHF Radio.
- With regard to training on the Covid-19 virus, all employees have received the documents and internet links to read which were given to us in 2020 as a reminder concerning cleaning products for site disinfection.
- Each year, in June and July, the entire team receives their training on the flora and fauna of the LSF NWA. This year, the training was held in early July.

2022 PROJECTS AND CONTRIBUTIONS

Contribution project 2019-2023 (ECCC)

As part of this new 2019-2023 ECCC contribution project, we have recruited the services of the Comité Zip du Haut-Saint-Laurent (HSL), a non-profit organization that shares our values and stands out for its dynamism and a network of diverse collaborators to complete this project.

For the last year of this contribution, the latter will take care of developing a creative animation workshop on wildlife and its habitat and updating the action plan.

This 4-year contribution is coming to an end and will be finalized in its entirety by March 31st 2023. Here is what we have been able to achieve with this contribution in 4 years:

- Communications plan highlighting Les Amis RNF LSF and their activities
- Development plan of the Pavilion Les Grands migrateurs
- Develop an animation activity on the great migrants
- Produce a thematic map of the RNF LSF
- Design an interpretation panel on the history of rabaska
- Develop an activity on aquatic fauna (fish)
- Enhancement of the Trille penché path (entertainment activity)
- Update of the action plan
- Creative animation workshop on wildlife and its habitat

Contribution project 2020-2023 (ECCC)

This contribution was funded to us on a three-year basis.

Since the beginning of this contribution, we have had several challenges, including the complications of the pandemic and for this reason the construction of the new reception center was late. We had to adjust this contribution to help our storage needs for our belongings and update entertainment equipment that was damaged during storage, such as our life jackets. All the same, we are happy with what we were able to achieve in this contribution, even if we had to adjust the projects that were planned for this contribution.

This contribution was successfully completed in November 2022. All reports have been sent and reimbursement requests have been received. Here is what we have been able to achieve with this contribution in 3 years:

- Storage and relocation of all Friends of the NWA LSF artifacts, equipment, files in preparation for the demolition of the visitor center
- Improvement of the Migratory Pavilion.
- Design an interpretation panel on the mission of the Friends of the RNF LSF (this one had to be modified for a retractable banner).
- Replacement of belongings that have been damaged during storage.
- Improved storage space and organization for our offices for all team members.
- Improvement of equipment for entertainment activities (for example a fleet of life jackets.
- The purchase of materials to create our removable kiosk to promote the relaunch of our activities outside the Lac-Saint-François National Wildlife Area.



- Restore our rabaskas with a new coat of paint.
- Restaurer nos rabaskas avec une nouvelle couche de peinture.

Grants and Contributions:

We remain attentive and monitor the calls for projects that will be announced in 2023, to be able to help us continue our projects and our mission. Some project ideas are:






A FINAL WORD
