The Lake Saint-François National Wildlife Area was first established in 1978 by Environment and Climate Change Canada's (ECCC) Canadian Wildlife Service in order to protect a network of marshes and swamps unique in Quebec. These environments are home to a diverse flora and fauna and rare species.



The protected area can be discovered by walking. When you go hiking, you are bound to leave traces of your presence in nature. However, it is possible to lessen your impact.

#### Hiker's code of conduct

- Stay on the marked trails.
- Do not take anything from the wild.
- Bring back all your waste, even biodegradable waste.
- Do not feed the animals.
- Observe wildlife from a distance.
- Respect the peace and tranquility of the area.

### Trails

L'Accueil, La Tour, La Mise à l'Eau

**Trail** Le Trille Penché


This easy-to-hike undergrowth trail passes through a forest of white cedars leading you to a spectacular old basswood tree. Early in the spring, the nodding trillium creates a magnificent carpet on the ground. A well-kept secret!



Piasetski Area Located 3 km from the Information centre (Visitor centre)

**Trails** L'Érablière, Le Caryer, Piasetski

A large part of this area is made up of dry areas and a diverse flora, including the sugar maple-hickory forest. Each trail offers you a singular scenery where many plant and animal species live. In the more humid section, you will be able to admire the famous poison sumac (poisonous) and the skunk cabbage. A trail to discover!
